
THE LODGES OF HEADINGLEY



Lodges around Headingley Village

Headingley village attracted many house with lodges around its outskirts – along the old road west to Kirkstall, on the new road across Headingley Moor to the north, and on the streets built east to Woodhouse Ridge. Perhaps not surprisingly, these have experienced a much higher rate of attrition than those further afield.

Lodges East of Headingley

The latest Victorian villas added to Headingley village were to the east, in the later nineteenth century.

18 St Michael's Mount and its **lodge** were built in 1883 for stockbroker William Wailes. But both were demolished in the 1970s, and the site is now occupied by Mary Morris House student accommodation, at 24 Shire Oak Road.

19 Wheatfield Lodge (listed 1976, Grade II, 1255681) was built about 1855, and is now the Sue Ryder Wheatfields Hospice. Originally, the house had a **lodge** on Wood Lane, but this was demolished in the 1960s.



20 Whinfield was built in the mid Victorian era, on Wood Lane (next to Wheatfields), but with a rear entrance and **lodge** on Alma Road. The house became Lupton Hall student accommodation after WWII, but was demolished in the '70s (along with Moorlands next door), to make way for the Lupton Residences of the University of Leeds; the lodge remains as part of this development (by the second entrance on Alma Road).

21 Moorlands was built in the mid Victorian era, on Wood Lane (next to Whinfield), also with a rear entrance and **lodge** on Alma Road. The house was demolished in the 1970s (along with Whinfield next door), to make way for the Lupton Residences of the University of Leeds; the lodge remains as part of this development (by the first entrance on Alma Road).
